



Fees

- Troop 214 uses a passbook type accounting system. Please contact the Scout Master or the Troop Treasurer for details on how this system works.
- Joining cost is \$30.00 (subject to change at any time) for new Scouts and Webelos crossing over into the Troop. Scouts transferring from another Troop will have a transfer fee which will be determined at the time of joining.
- Uniform cost, please check with the Scout office for pricing for the class "A" uniform shirt and the related items. We hesitate to list prices here since pricing can change at any time. The class "B" red Troop t-shirt is available only from the Troop and is currently priced at \$10.00. Available sizes are: adult S, M, L, XL.
- Adult registration is \$10 per year. This fee is set by BSA National.
- Troop dues are paid by each Scout. Dues are \$30 per year and are paid via your passbook account. (National BSA fees and the Boys Life magazine subscription paid from this)
- Camping costs vary based on the activities that will take place. As a general rule a \$3.00 fee per breakfast & per lunch, \$4.00 per supper is charged to a Scout's account. (For example a weekend campout would have breakfast, lunch, supper on Saturday and breakfast on Sunday. This equals 2 breakfast, 1 lunch and 1 supper. So \$13 meal expense would be charged to that Scout's account.) Other additional expenses would be charged if applicable (permits, admissions, transportation expense, etc.).
- High adventure trips and special trips will be more expensive, those estimated expenses would be announced at Troop meetings or special meetings held to explain items related for just that event.
- Financial aid is available to qualified Scouts. Please contact the Scout Master.

Gear

The troop provides camping gear such as tents, tarps, lanterns, camping stoves, cooking utensils, pots, pans, and other general camping supplies. It is suggested you purchase only the necessary items to start with, until your Scout is sure camping is for him. Quality items are suggested over cheap items as inferior items tend to need replaced often, where as quality items will hold up much better.

The following list are items each Scout must supply for themselves to start with.

- a quality sleeping bag and ground pad
- mess kit, eating utensils, drinking cup or mug
- quality boots (tennis shoes are not allowed on winter campouts)
- good jacket (quality winter coat for winter campouts)
- rain jacket and pants (poncho's are strongly discouraged)
- extra set of cloths (shirt, pants, socks)
- flashlight (LED suggested)



Highly recommended.

- boonie type hat - covers ears to prevent severe sunburn (especially recommended for summer camp and high adventure camps – baseball style caps should be avoided)
- multi-tools are very handy
- long term, a quality backpack is a good investment. Check with experienced leaders prior to making a purchase as size and styles vary greatly
- Nalgene type water bottles (unbreakable)
- sunglasses

Sheath knives, hatchets, or camp axes are NOT allowed.
